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About L'Arche Calgary

L'Arche Calgary is proud to be part of the international L'Arche Federation, a global network of 160 communities in 37 countries.

L'Arche Calgary was founded in 1973.

Our story began in August 1973, when Marymount, the first-ever L'Arche Calgary home, opened its doors. That moment marked the beginning of a remarkable story with 52 years of community, growth, and love.

Over the decades, L'Arche Calgary has been a place filled with memories, joy, celebration, meaningful relationships, cherished traditions, and countless milestones. We have had the privilege of welcoming hundreds of people, including Core Members, Assistants, volunteers, friends, and family members, and each person has left a lasting imprint on our community.

Today, L'Arche Calgary has grown to include five homes - Annapurna, Haeremai, Kichiyak, Marymount, and Villa Maria - the Tamarack Day Program, and a Supported Independent Living Program (SILP).

In each of our homes, Core Members live alongside Assistants who join us from all over the world. Each house is as unique as the people who call it home. People with and without intellectual disabilities experience the rhythms of daily life alongside one another.



Whether it's a quiet weekday dinner or a festive celebration, the family model of care builds deep bonds of trust and mutually beneficial relationships.

Our **Tamarack Day Program** provides engaging programs and activities for Core Members from Monday to Friday. Our individualized approach ensures that each person's day is relevant to their goals, interests, and needs. From music therapy to baking, art, and community outings, Tamarack is a space where Core Members grow in confidence, skill, and joy, while always supported by dedicated Assistants.

Our Support Independent Living Program (SILP) is designed to help Core Members live independently while receiving the support they need. Core members receive assistance from occasional visits to regular help with daily tasks such as meal preparation, transportation, and medical administration. This program enhances their personal, social, and spiritual well-being, promoting independence and integration into the broader community.

Together, we continue to create meaningful connections in a community that not only supports one another but also shines as a beacon of inclusion in the City of Calgary.



This is a long journey, and we are only at the beginning. With hope in our hearts and love as our guide, we are setting the first stones in place at Kichiyak House. Thanks to generous support from the Calgary Foundation and CREB, renovations have been completed at Kichiyak. The narrow hallways and aging structure of our smallest home have now been transformed into an open, accessible, bright space.





Meet Kirstie

Core Member in SILP.

A Rising Star in Para-Swimming

Kirstie Kasko, born in October 1992, is a talented Canadian para-swimmer whose passion for the sport and remarkable dedication have propelled her into the international spotlight. Hailing from a close-knit family of five, which includes a brother and a sister, Kirstie's journey into competitive swimming began at an early age. Her resilience and determination in overcoming challenges are what have truly shaped her journey and success.

Growing up in a family that valued hard work and perseverance, Kirstie was introduced to swimming very early in life. With her siblings by her side, she quickly developed a love for the water and began pursuing the sport more seriously as a teenager. Her journey wasn't without obstacles, and it was her tenacity and the support of her family that laid the foundation for what would become a flourishing para-swimming career.

Breaking Through at the 2011 Parapan American Games

Kirstie's international career took off in 2011 when she competed in the Parapan American Games in Guadalajara, Mexico. This event proved to be a turning point for the young swimmer. Kasko made a name for herself by emerging as one of Canada's brightest new talents, winning two gold medals in the 200-metre freestyle and the 100-metre backstroke. Her outstanding performance in Guadalajara marked the beginning of what would become a series of impressive accomplishments on the world stage.



A Paralympic Debut in 2012

Just one year after her success in Guadalajara, Kirstie made her debut at the 2012 Paralympic Games in London, England. Competing in the S14 category, which is for athletes with an intellectual disability, Kirstie faced some of the best para-swimmers in the world. Though she didn't earn a medal, her results were a testament to her grit and determination. She finished 12th in both the 100-metre backstroke and the 100-metre breaststroke, and 14th in the 200-metre freestyle.

It wasn't just her race results that stood out—Kirstie also broke three Canadian records that year in the 200-metre and 400-metre freestyle and the 100-metre breaststroke. She attributed much of her progress to a greater focus on technical training, strength conditioning, and even yoga, which helped her build both physical and mental strength.

The Road to the 2013 IPC World Championships

Building on her success in 2012, Kirstie continued to push herself further. In 2013, she competed at the IPC World Championships, where she participated in four events. This event was another opportunity for Kirstie to demonstrate her skill and resilience as a top-level athlete. Though the competition was fierce, Kirstie's consistency and commitment to improving continued to shine through.

2015: Qualifying for the Parapan American Games

Kirstie's hard work and dedication culminated in 2015 when she successfully qualified for her second Parapan American Games. The Speedo Can Am Para-swimming Championships in Toronto that year saw Kirstie earn impressive finishes. She secured second place in the 200-metre freestyle, and third place in both the 100-metre breaststroke and 100-metre backstroke. These results reinforced her position as one of Canada's premier para-swimmers and set the stage for future international competitions.

A New Chapter in Her Journey with SILP

Kirstie's story is one of remarkable resilience, determination, and growth. A celebrated paraswimmer with numerous accolades, including gold medals at the 2011 Parapan American Games and multiple Canadian records, Kirstie's journey doesn't stop at the pool. In August 2023, she took a significant step in her personal and professional life by entering the Supported Independent Living Program (SILP) from L'Arche Calgary, a community that supports individuals with intellectual disabilities. This new chapter marks another important milestone for Kirstie as she continues to challenge herself both in and outside of the water.

Embracing Independence with L'Arche Calgary

The transition into the SILP program represents Kirstie's commitment fostering to independence and personal growth. L'Arche Calgary provides a supportive environment for individuals to live as independently as possible, with access to mentorship, life skills, engagement. For Kirstie, community program not only aligns with her values of selfempowerment but also offers her a chance to deepen her connections within the community, pursue her passions, and live life on her own terms.

Being part of the L'Arche community has provided Kirstie with a sense of belonging and encouragement as she navigates the challenges of independent living. This step has allowed her to continue building on her strengths while embracing new opportunities for personal development.

With the skills and experiences she has gained through both her swimming and personal journey, there's no doubt she is well-prepared to take on this challenge. The 2025 Parapan American Games are a milestone Kirstie has set her sights on, and she is working tirelessly to make it a reality.



Denis brought warmth, humility, and a servant's heart to his work, embodying the values of L'Arche through his daily actions. He helped foster an atmosphere of belonging, where everyone was embraced and celebrated.

Denis was not only a caregiver but a connector. Through his involvement in Breakfast with the Bishop, he welcomed and encouraged the participation of Indigenous Core Members, ensuring they too experienced the joy and dignity of inclusion in broader faith and civic life. His ability to see each person's worth and bring them into meaningful spaces was a gift that left a lasting mark on the community. Whether he was organizing spiritual events or simply sharing a song and a smile, Denis led with love and made sure others were seen and valued.

A gifted musician, a devoted family man, and a man of deep faith, Denis used every part of his life to uplift others. His compassion extended well beyond L'Arche into the streets of Calgary, across international borders, and into the hearts of everyone he met. As we remember Denis, we honour a life that was poured out in love, and we recommit ourselves to the inclusive, compassionate world he worked so faithfully to build.





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
